The White Rose Project takes its name from a group of German university students who resisted Nazi oppression. Their primary tool of resistance was writing: between 1942 and 1943, the White Rose Movement wrote and distributed a series of six leaflets across Germany, calling for passive resistance against the Nazi regime.

On 18 February 1943, the group leaders Sophie and Hans Scholl were caught distributing the pamphlets at Munich University. They were found guilty of treason by the People's Court of Germany and, along with another member, Christoph Probst, were executed by guillotine on 22 February. Other members and friends of the White Rose Movement were sentenced to prison, and some to death.

The members of the White Rose Movement chose to speak out against tyranny, despite knowing the lethal consequences should they be caught. This creative project serves to honour their memory, and ensure that their sacrifices were not in vain; that tyranny and injustice continue to be resisted by brave young people.

CATEGORIES

LEARNERS MAY CHOOSE ONE CATEGORY FROM THE LIST BELOW.

CATEGORY A: CREATIVE WRITING - POEM / STORY / ESSAY

Inspired by your knowledge of the Holocaust and the White Rose Movement, write a poem, story or essay reflecting on resistance to injustice and the concept of memory. Submissions should not exceed 1000 words in the high school learner category and 3000 words in the tertiary students category.

CATEGORY B: 2D OR 3D ARTWORK

Inspired by your knowledge of the Holocaust and the White Rose Movement, create an artwork depicting resistance to injustice.

Participants may use any medium or a combination of media including but not limited to ink, crayons, pencil, markers, pastels, charcoal, watercolours, acrylics, oil paint, paper, recycled materials, collage, digital design etc. If possible please use FIXATIVES so that works will not smudge or be altered by handling.

Participants are advised to avoid sensationalism or graphic representations of victims of the Holocaust or other human rights abuses in their artwork.

CATEGORY C: VIDEO

Inspired by your knowledge of the Holocaust and the White Rose Movement, create a short video contemplating resistance to injustice and the concept of memory. Videos should be no longer than five (5) minutes for high school learners and no longer than ten (10) minutes for tertiary students.

CATEGORY D: PERFORMING ARTS PIECE

Inspired by your knowledge of the Holocaust and the White Rose Movement, create a monologue, dance, song or other performance piece which you can submit as a video, audio or written file. Submissions should be no longer than five (5) minutes for high school learners and ten (10) minutes for tertiary students.

REGULATIONS AND GUIDELINES

ASSESSMENT CRITERIA

- Original thinking and authenticity.
- Creativity of concept.
- Attention to structure and form.
- Effective use of chosen media.
- A level of visual literacy and inventiveness.
- Originality in use of technology where appropriate.
- Technical proficiency.

FORMAT FOR SUBMISSION

The original piece must be submitted.
 Copying the work of others is not allowed and submissions that show evidence of plagiarism will not be considered. Videos, songs, perfomances to be submitted on a flashdrive, DVD, CD or sent in electronically (via email/WeTransfer/Dropbox).

SUBMISSION

- Participants must not write their names on the submission itself, as all entries will be judged anonymously.
